

CAP Directors Report

June 2021

Adult Athletics

Beach Yoga has started on Wednesdays through June. Utilizing Ripley Park's beach was a great addition to the park activities. Renewing of memberships have picked up for the Fitness Center, especially with the extension of our summer hours.

Adult Enrichment

There are no Adult Enrichment programs happening at this time.

Aquatics

In June alone we have been able to schedule 34 swimmers for private lessons while continuing to work through the waitlist. We also started our Summer Master's program on June 1. We have several groups taking advantage of the pool this Summer. Breezeway Bubbles, CAP CARE, and Deerfield Day Camp have all been utilizing the pool at least one day a week. Slow Flow Yoga has transitioned outside of the pool in the grassy area out back.

CAP CARE & Preschool

CAP CARE is continuing to receive grants and stipends. In June we received the following:

- Staff retention grant through DCF and child care counts - \$7,500
- Program development grant through DCF and child care counts - \$6,955

Day Camp has had four successful weeks of camp with trips that included the Wild Rumpus Circus, Gracie's Berries, Camden Park, and Henry Vilas Zoo. A total of 26 children also passed the swim test on swimming days.

Registration is filling up for the 2021-2022 school year. At the end of June CAP CARE will have a waitlist for Imagination Station

Art and Play hosted 16 three to four year olds. Each week the sitters in the Babysitter Safety class assisted the Art and Play class as well.

Safe@Home had 13 children during summer school and graduated 13 (Tiny Human Bodyguards) .

Community Café

The first Community Café was held June 3. The estimated number in attendance was 250. The amazing CAP Board and staff hosted the event. There were no groups volunteering to host the July event. The August Community Café will be hosted by the Cambridge Foundation.

Food Pantry

The Cambridge Food Pantry served 46 households in the month of June including 15 adults, 12 kids, and 19 seniors. 100% of Food Pantry clients shopped in person. The Pantry also added three new households in June and continues to welcome new volunteers each week.

Ripley Park

Ripley Park has had a very busy June. Even with the weather fluctuating between hot, cold, and rainy, we have a very profitable season so far. The gate alone brought in alone over \$15,000. Based on admission sales and park pass usage, we served about 7,000 guests in June. This does not count those that attended free functions such as Community Meal or when the gate was closed. We've had to be very creative making additional parking. The last of the 508 season passes were sold over the 4th of July weekend. The concession stand has been very well received with sales over \$3,500 for the month of June with a daily average of \$167 for the days it was open. Shelter rentals have been going strong with an average of 3 a weekend and 1 bouncy house rental per weekend.

Seniors

Senior Luncheons have been going strong. Both luncheons on June were held at Keystone Grill. Guests participated in Bingo for one and listened to a sponsored pianist/singer at the other. There has been an average of 30 attending. We are going to be utilizing other food vendors, venues and entertainment for future luncheons. We are still actively looking for sponsoring and donations to provide entertainment at future luncheons. We are also working with Plans in Paradise travel agency in Cambridge to possibly add group travel next year.

Youth Athletics

Adam has been taking on his first season of Summer Baseball and Softball. There are four Little League teams and three softball teams. Both sports are off to a great start! Coach Pitch and T-ball are also back with fantastic numbers.

Youth Center

The Youth Center opened for summer hours while summer school was in session from noon until 4:30pm. We had an average of 8 students per day. We did not offer a free snack or milk but they did purchase lunch, snack and beverage options daily. We will continue to offer summer hours post-summer school, but only on Tuesdays and Thursdays as the same time of 12-4:30pm.
